From Our Pastor

What Is Going On?

If you were asked the question: What is the Church, how would you answer? Is it a gathering of likeminded individuals who enjoy gathering on Sundays? Is it a volunteer organization that has a dedication to Jesus? Is it a social group of friendships that enjoy each other's company?

Some would say the Church is just another human institution, like all other institutions. It comes into existence for a time, has a purpose, for a while, but when new times come, new institutions are created to take the place of the old. Perhaps the Church needs to be replaced? Some wholeheartedly say, "YES!" Maybe you've heard the sentiment, "I'm religious, but I dislike institutional religion," or the more generic, "I'm spiritual, but not religious."?

In his book, **Letter to the American Church**, author Eric Metaxas states that the real question is more pointed: "When is the Church actually **being** the Church of Jesus Christ, instead being it in name only?" Something has been lost in our time. The Church always has been a prophetic voice to the world, especially in times of tyranny and turmoil. Metaxas argues that the American Church has lost much of its prophetic voice, either by keeping Church separate from the world (something limited to a church building on Sundays), or by relinquishing that voice altogether. Alas!

Metaxas also notes that people in the pews are more and more realizing that things are not as they were, even a few years ago! Something has been creeping toward us, and is now People "are looking to their pastoral charging toward us. leaders to acknowledge this, to help them understand what is happening and to lead them in standing against it." If we don't address it, the current troubles that are spreading across our land and the whole world, will grab hold. Indeed, there is something eerily familiar with what is happening in the American Church and what was happening in the German Church in the 1930's. "The German Church was silent in the face of evil; but can there be any question whether the American Church of our own time is guilty of the same silence?" According to the author, the horrific evil that came upon the world because of the German Church's failure to recognize it and speak against it, is likely a foretaste of what will befall the world if the American Church goes down that same path.

Over the next several weeks I will be taking my cue from Metaxas's book, and preaching/warning against "What is Going On." How did we get here, and what is coming? This isn't hyperbole; this isn't saber rattling; this isn't fire and brimstone. No, this will be a series of sermons warning people of what is happening in the world, and to hold fast to Jesus Christ! Going along and getting along is not the answer, nor will it not stop what is coming. The Church must stand! Put on the whole armor of God!

NEWS from SESSION in APRIL:

There were no ACTION items.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Worship and Education – Elder M. Cerilli reported that the committee has decided to purchase a protective storage case for the new Communion service. Due to the success of the Fish Fry Fridays, the committee plans to sponsor an informal get-together on the second Friday of each month where everyone is welcome to bring their own food and meet at the church for fellowship and games. The committee is continuing to plan for the Agape meal at Pentecost on May 19 and the Teacher/Choir Appreciation Sunday on May 26.

Finance – Elder S. Elkettani provided the March 2024 financial overview. Also, S. Elkettani reported that the online giving link to the MUPC page has been provided to us and is in the process of being applied to the website.

<u>Mission and Membership</u> - Elder J. McNamara reported on following committee activities:

- **The committee is actively reviewing the different local mission organizations that the church supports and determining the support to be offered for the 2024 Maplewood Missions Giving Program.
- ** One Great Hour of Sharing realized donations of **\$1,077** this year, surpassing the committee's goal of \$1,000.
- **The **May** 7 Union Mission Dinner is being planned.
- **High quality video of Pastor Steve's sermons continues to be produced and posted to the current website and Facebook page. Favorable comments continue to come in, the latest of which came from Cape Town, South Africa.
- **Website development continues and newsletter upgrades in color have begun.

Personnel – Elder S. Elkettani reported that we have been notified that the Board of Pensions has issued a proposal that changes the medical coverage and costs for pastors starting in 2025. Details of the proposed changes, expenditures and coverage for our pastor may be obtained from Elder S. Elkettani

Property – Elder D. Ferry reported that the annual AARP tax preparations for seniors and disabled have concluded, with donations of **\$1,156** this year. All of the church's AC units have been serviced. In addition, monthly maintenance cost for the new color copier and the costs involved in exceeding the monthly allotment of black and white and color copies was reviewed. Not included in the original 2024 budget, everyone should be mindful of the extra expenditures.

From the Emergency Planning Group (EPG)

Choices

Welcome to the May update for the *Emergency Planning Group*! Spring is in full swing now. Hopefully you've got some food of your own growing. Even a couple bean plants in a pot or just a tomato plant can provide you with some wholesome food. Prices for food are not expected to come down anytime soon so save where you can.


We finished up our *Herbs for Food and Medicine* class last month. Truly God provides for all our needs and gives us bodies that can largely heal themselves if we don't consistently make bad choices. Using herbs or common plants for good health works best when we haven't abused our bodies with processed food – but even when we don't eat perfectly, God has graciously provided things that can help bring us back into balance.

This month we are doing a second round of our *Scenarios* class, and it will be run the same way the first-round class was in March. We have a collection of cards with prewritten scenarios that put the reader in a difficult situation, and we take turns answering how we would handle it. One of the things we discussed last time was how timing and choices might affect how we react in a given scenario. For example, if you had a stockpile of 6 months of food, and your neighbor comes by after just a week of no electricity, you might offer him a few cans for his family. But if you're 5 months into a situation where you've had no power and you only have a week of food left, how might your level of generosity change? Timing and length of emergency might affect your choices, especially if it takes food out of your children's mouths. It makes for interesting conversation.

Speaking of choices, there are a whole series of decisions we make every day and over time that impact that critical moment when we are presented with an emergency. Recently I read a story about a survivor from the Francis Scott Key bridge collapse in Baltimore. He was a bridge worker. As I read, I thought about the circumstances that affected his survival. He was working on the bridge but took his break in his truck. When the truck fell into the water, he was able to more easily escape because he had manual windows which he rolled down to get out. But when he got out, he had to hold onto floating steel debris because he couldn't swim. What if he had taken his break outside his vehicle? What if he had learned to swim when he was younger? What if his truck windows were electric and inoperable? What if there had been no floating debris close enough for him to hold onto before he panicked and drowned?

When that unexpected emergency happened, every choice up to that point converged into that critical moment. No sane person expected that bridge to collapse, but the choices he made dictated how he went through that emergency. The same is true for us – our choices now will impact our ability to survive an emergency later.





We cover a lot of different topics in the EPG classes. Economics, geopolitics, dedollarization, growing and preserving food, making water safe, alternate power sources, making fire, precious metal options, dealing with nuclear fallout, medical options, cyberwarfare, preparing with prayer...we run the gamut on topics. The impetus for these classes is to give you choices you can make now for a better outcome later.

Cultivate the habit of making good choices that will give you the best chance in an emergency. Remember: *Good choices give you options. Bad choices leave you few or none.* Let's make good choices for ourselves and our families so that when the inevitable emergency comes, we can not only weather it but also lend a hand where needed. Maranatha!
